As June transitions into July, our neighborhoods begin summer clean-ups, and our thoughts turn to themes of freedom, independence, and liberty. With the approach of our country's annual 4th of July celebration, we often reflect on the outward expressions of our freedom. "Freedom" is undeniably a crucial word in our modern world and a cornerstone concept in our nation. It can be a contentious term, as interpretations vary widely. However, its fundamental importance remains unquestionable. Having grown up in the Democratic Republic of God and traveled extensively, I've witnessed firsthand where freedom is scarce. In French, there's a saying: "freedom ends where mine begins." That means, know your limits, don't cross into mine. The Bible places significant emphasis on freedom. The Old Testament recounts God's liberation of His people from slavery in Egypt, while the New Testament focuses on freedom from sin, death, and the devil. Paul's letter to the Galatians (5:1) is recognized for its exploration of freedom, often labeled the "Epistle of Freedom." Reflecting on Galatians, it's worthwhile to consider the freedom that Christ offers, a freedom central to the gospel. What does freedom mean for a Christian? Jesus claims in John 8, "If the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed." Galatians 5 begins powerfully with: "For freedom Christ has set us free. Stand firm, therefore, and do not submit again to a yoke of slavery." "Christ has set us free, not solely for political liberty, though important, but for spiritual freedom. It liberates our conscience, fostering joy and fearlessness in the face of impending judgment. This freedom, for which Christ sacrificed, is profound and immeasurable. It reconciles us with God through forgiveness of sins, a freedom we commemorate weekly. It starts with acknowledging our bondage to sin and culminates in the revelation that Christ died for us, securing God's forgiveness. Indeed, Jesus liberates us from the chains of sin, death, and the devil, enabling us to become new creations. As we prepare to move in Fall, we are launching a prayer group dedicated to weekly intercession for the church, families, community, and church property. Everyone is invited; meetings will be held every Wednesday at 6 PM. This prayer time is to keep the connection between us and God, so that we can experience the freedom that the Lord has given us in Him through Him. Paul understood the precariousness of this gift of freedom and cautioned us to stand firm, lest we regress into bondage of sin. It's a faint but real risk. In Galatians, he warns against returning to the yoke of slavery (Galatians 5:13): "For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for self-indulgence, but through love become slaves to one another." Therefore, let us stand firm and not submit again to the yoke of slavery. As we enter July, let us not only celebrate our national freedom but also meditate on the deeper freedom offered through Christ. May we cherish and responsibly exercise our freedoms, guided by love and service to one another. In this season of reflection and celebration, let us remember that true freedom is found in Christ, the freedom that liberates our souls and empowers us to live in accordance with God's will. As we gather for festivities, may our hearts be open to the profound spiritual freedom that transforms lives and communities. May this freedom in Christ resonate deeply within us, shaping our actions and relationships, as we strive to live in the fullness of God's grace, and reflect the trans formative power of Christ's sacrifice.

<u>Larry/Circuit 12 & DOC Items-Circuit 12</u> – Sept. 24 – Save the date as the laity committee is inviting all clergy and congregations to participate in a dinner to welcome the new pastors in the circuit at St. Lukes in Sheboygan. Also Rev. Mpoyo has been invited to be the leader of Circuit 12. Sheboygan Community Café July 22 10:30-2:00 Dick Bemis, Teri Treichel, Larry and Nadine Huiras will be assisting with serving lunch. Midwest Mission Sept. 17-19 trip from Zion. There are 2 openings available for this trip. Scheduling a DOC meeting soon

Pastor's Items- Rev. Mpoyo shared she has always had a prayer group for the church in her congregation and would like to start an in-person group in addition to the prayer chain; Terri checked with a few on dates and times, suggests Wednesday nights. Rev. will be calling with some invites to start the group. Rev. and Terri have been doing home visits and have been going well. Ernie and Betty would welcome our prayers. She is working toward setting up monthly visits and communion for all. We discussed shifting gifts for shut ins to another holiday such as Thanksgiving or Easter instead of Christmas to share with them at other times of the year, and will raise with DOC. Discussed having a media team for worship so we have consistent presence on Facebook and streaming. Discussed the potential to shift time of service to 9:15 year-round. This would allow for Sunday School and confirmation after church, along with fellowship time. Need to have a conversation with Sunday school team and musicians first. Also poll the congregation, potentially by putting together a mailing to explain the proposed plan, the rationale, and gather their feedback.

Wendy/Worship- Worship is trying to get folks involved in the service. Sending around sign-up sheets to have people sign up for greeting, camera, usher, PowerPoint. We need to find a way for people to be comfortable with what they are signing up to do and fills all our needs for worship. Want to make more updates to Facebook and include more pictures from service or events and get them uploaded (scholarships, etc). Discussion on camera set up and improving that so we don't need a separate person and it provides better video experience as well. When we don't have a camera on during service, we hear from people who are missing it. Rally Day – second Sunday in Sept., we will highlight our ministry with each committee participating to share what each is doing throughout the year; Wendy has a list of groups to have to potentially have tables, displays or other ways to share what we are doing.

<u>Shirley/Youth Items</u> - VBS planning underway, looking to figure out who will be assisting with teaching and kids that will be in attendance.

<u>Terri/Lay Leader-</u> 175th Anniversary for Zion in 2025, discussed what was done at 150-year anniversary; proposing Rally Day 2025 for the celebration, would give us enough time to put a directory together, invite Bishop, DS and past pastors and put together a good event. Suggesting hot dogs and Pot Luck to simplify menu for Rally Day, discussion on who would be our guests and who we would invite for Rally Day – members we haven't seen, neighbors; how we might reach out to them to invite – can we get a group to make call; need to ask Jay for a list of folks that are members that we haven't seen in a while (Stacy will ask Jay to get it)

Notes From Parish Nurse Nancy Eberhardt, RN

Dear Friends of Zion UMC,

Greetings in the name of our Merciful Savior, Redeemer, and Physician! I hope you are able to spend some time enjoying your family and friends, and the blessings which come to us in the summer. This month I would like to share some thoughts with you on finding and keeping a Healthy Balance in our Lives. This is a tough one for me since I am cleaning out my home to downsize. So I have to listen to my own message carefully.

What is the Relationship Between Health and Balance?

Actually, wholistic health refers to a process of wholeness that exists when there is balance among our different dimensions (physical, emotional, spiritual, social, vocational, and environmental). As Christians, we believe that balance is only possible when we base our life on Christ; the spiritual dimension is our real essence. In John 10:10 we read, "....I have come that they might have life, and have it to the full". It seems that often we try to <u>create</u> our own "full life" and find ourselves over-committed, under-appreciated, fatigued, frustrated and out of balance. We need to find the "full life" and balance that only Christ can give.

How Can I Keep My Life in Balance?

There are several specific approaches we can use to nourish this gift of balance. First, we can consider our current life in terms of energy investment, values, and priorities. Are we 'spending' our life in activities that have eternal consequences? Second, we can develop an action plan, if we would like to spend our energy and time in a different way. To be helpful, the plan would need to identify what needs to be changed, what it needs to change to, and how the change will be made. Third, we can live our changed lives with the confidence that "....He who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Christ Jesus" Philippians 1:6.

Is Your Life in Balance?

Jesus speaks to us with these words, "Peace I leave with you; My peace I give you... Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid" John 14:27. May your days be blessed with Jesus' peace, wholistic health and balance.
